To find the scholarship application forms, please look on Teams under the ISS-Grads 2025/26 account. Save a copy of the application form to your computer, naming it lastname_firstname_nameofaward. Example: Smith_Suzanne_OptimistClub.

- Complete the Financial Awards application form. The application is a fillable Word document. Please complete the application on your computer using Word. Using other computer applications will result in different formats. Handwritten applications are difficult for our donors to read. If you must do it by hand, please do not use a pencil.
- Deadline to apply for District Awards is February 12, 2026, at noon

Grade 12 students that are taking a distance/distributed learning course - If a mark for the purpose of applying to a Post-Secondary Institution is required, the course must be either 50% complete or a final mark may be required by a certain deadline. *Check! Most Online/distance education courses must be 100% completed by a certain date. Students need to check with each institution's specific requirements and rules around using online courses for the purpose of admission

Students who have applied to a university/college for entry in September 2026 are reminded to regularly check the institution's secured student service website/portal for new messages. The post-secondary schools require students to use the identification number that was noted on their confirmation letter along with a password. These sites contain important details regarding admission offers, course pre-requisites, registration, deadline dates, contact information, grades, etc. The journey of planning their future is an exciting one, and your involvement makes all the difference!

LEARNING THROUGH STORY: ENGLISH FIRST PEOPLES & THEATRE COMPANY UPDATE

EFP & Theatre Company students recently deepened their understanding of Indian Residential School history through a visit to a former Residential School site. This experience grounded their learning in powerful and meaningful ways. Earlier this month, students participated in a community conversation with an invited Elder and cultural educators as part of their study of Lexéywa: I Pass the Torch to You (Bea Silver).

They began exploring how to create a respectful performance piece that shares truths connected to Residential School experiences. In preparation for this visit, cultural knowledge keepers joined our classes to teach students the proper protocols for welcoming Elders into our learning space.

We were proud of the care, humility, and thoughtfulness our students brought to this work as they continued their journey of understanding and reconciliation.

IMAGINE ARCADE: PROJECT-BASED LEARNING FOR THE WIN!

There was an almost deafening buzz in the Computer Lab. It was the final day of the term, and our Computer Programming class had invited other classes to come and try out their games. But this wasn't just an excuse for other students to get out of class... there was something special about this exhibition.

In one corner, 6 computers were running the idle-clicker, Tree Game, where students feverishly mashed the tree in order to earn gems and purchase rewards. In another corner, students competed to set new high scores in a retro-styled platformer, while others played the beautiful high school drama, Clayburt's Senior Slump, or battled their friends in the 3D multiplayer battler, Realm of the Wobs.

So what made these games so special? Teamwork. Iteration. Playtesting. Passion.

These projects absolutely dripped with the love that their creators poured into them. To these students, this was not just some programming assignment – it was a personal passion project. They had to depend on their teammates to help them accomplish what they couldn't do alone. They prototyped, tested, failed, iterated – over. And. Over. Again.

In the end, they didn't just create a game.


They created something people wanted to play.


INCLUSIVE DESIGN TEAM - SKILL DEVELOPMENT

Many students benefit from support in executive functioning: the mental skills that help us plan, organize, manage time, focus attention, and regulate emotions. At Imagine, our Inclusive Design Team works closely with teachers to support the development of these skills for all learners by embedding strategies directly into classroom routines. This includes universal supports such as visual schedules, checklists, timers, and modelled planning, which help students understand expectations and stay on track. Some students benefit from more targeted help, like small-group lessons, individualized work plans, or guided practice using organizational tools. Others require essential supports, including personalized regulation strategies, or step-by-step task breakdowns to participate meaningfully in class.

At home, families can reinforce these skills by using calendars, creating consistent routines, and modelling problem-solving or time-management strategies. Strengthening executive functioning builds confidence and independence, both inside and outside of school. By supporting these skills through an inclusive approach, we help students navigate academic challenges more effectively and prepare for success in life beyond the classroom.

INDIGENOUS EDUCATION AT IMAGINE HIGH

As November has come to a close, we are grateful for a month of learning, connection, culture, and remembrance. Thank you to our students, staff, families, and Elders for supporting this work. Here is a brief look back and a glimpse ahead.

November Highlights:

- Walking the Path Together: Post-Secondary Dinner (Oct. 30): A supportive evening for students and families exploring opportunities after high school.
- Grade 9 Indigenous Meet-Up (Nov. 5): Students connected through games, activities, doughnuts, and prizes as they transitioned into high school.
- Halq'eméylem Language Course: This new elective is giving students meaningful ways to learn and engage with the local language.
- Indigenous Veterans Day and Remembrance Day Ceremony (Nov. 7): A combined ceremony featuring teachings about the experiences of Indigenous veterans, performances by the Imagine High Drumming Group, and reflective videos.
- Rock Your Mocs (Nov. 14): Students wore moccasins or the colour turquoise to celebrate pride and heritage. Many also created miniature beaded moccasins during a lunch-hour craft activity.
- Cultural Centre Field Trip: Three Crow Productions (Nov. 19): Students attended a powerful presentation by local storyteller Dallis Yellowfly.

Looking Ahead to December

- Indigenous Grad Meet-Up (Dec. 3): Grade 12 Indigenous students will gather to discuss graduation plans, supports, and cultural elements.
- Drumming Workshop (Dec. 10): The Drumming Group will explore teachings and traditions and create mini witness drums.
- Deep Dive Cultural Projects: Students will continue cultural projects such as weaving, beading, and crafting, exploring both creative processes and the teachings connected to each practice.

The book explores intelligence, emotion, and the surprising ways humans can bond with creatures completely unlike us. It's both eye-opening and warm, making it a quick but memorable read. This book would be perfect for students who love animal nonfiction, fans of books like H Is for Hawk or The Anthropocene Reviewed, or anyone curious about the natural world and the mysteries it still holds.

SCHOOL DISTRICT 33 CAREER EDUCATION - DUAL CREDIT

Here's why you should seriously consider applying:

What's great about these Dual Credit Programs

- You can apply to take post-secondary courses while in high school Chilliwack School District (SD33) covers tuition
- · These courses count both as high school credits (electives) and as post-secondary credits
- Taking dual credit courses makes the transition to post-secondary smoother

Programs You Can Apply For (current dual credit options in SD33):

- Early Childhood Education or Inclusive Education Assistant part-time studies at UFV (4 courses each)
- Hairstylist Level 1 Train with a Red Seal Hairstylist through VCC/SD33 partnership
- Health Sciences studies part-time studies at UFV (4 courses)
- Professional Cook 1 Train with a Red Seal Chef Instructor through VCC / SD33 partnership
- Regional Career Programs (Trades) Auto service, welding, carpentry, and more via UFV

Who's Eligible & What It Takes

- University of the Fraser Valley (UFV) programs are for Gr. 12 students, which would require you to apply for in Gr. 11
- Vancouver Community College (VCC) programs are for Grade 11 or Grade 12 students, which would require you to apply for in Gr 10 or 11
- There's an application process which will also require you to write a cover letter of intent, provide a resume, and get references

What to Do Next

- 2. Talk to your School Counsellor They can help you figure out which program fits you and how to complete your grad requirements!
- 3. **Book an Appointment** There's a Dual Credit & Apprenticeship Facilitator (DCAF) you can meet with (via QR on the website)
- 4. Prepare Your Application Get your application, resume, references, and cover letters ready

One more thing... Are You Working in a Trade?

- 1. We have four courses available to students in grade 9, 10, 11, and 12
- 2. Must be performing paid work with a qualified trades person
- 3. Must be employed in a Skilled Trades BC apprenticeable trade
- 4. Earn up to 16 graduation credits and get on the job training as an apprentice
- 5. Requires an application, submitted to your Dual Credit & Apprenticeship Facilitator
- 6. Off timetable
